TF: INTRODUCE YOURSELF, WHO YOU ARE AND A BRIEF OVERVIEW OF YOUR CAREER HISTORY?

PM: My name is Paul Martin, I'm probably best known as a local authority Chief Executive. I worked as a permanent Chief Executive for four councils – Peterborough, Sutton, Wandsworth and Richmond, and two as an interim – Government of Jersey and Ealing. I'm currently working as a consultant for the City of London Corporation on their Destination City programme aimed at driving economic growth in the Square Mile, as well as consultancy work in the United States.

TF: HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN AN INTERIM FOR AND WHAT LED YOU TO CHOOSING THAT AS THE NEXT STEP IN YOUR CAREER?

PM: I started as an interim in 2021, so around three years now. I'm a big believer in keeping your experience fresh and finding new ways to develop your skills. Being a local authority Chief Executive is by definition a parochial role, you are sucked into the life of the area and I really wanted to explore different settings, organisational challenges and challenge myself to work in diverse cultures.

TF: DID YOU FIND THE TRANSITION TO BECOMING AN INTERIM A CHALLENGE?

PM: It was both easy and difficult. There's continuity in familiarity with local government, working with politicians, the role of the Chief Executive and how to effectively manage and lead. It was a challenge getting to grips with the pace of interim work and the speed with which you need to become highly effective in a role you will likely occupy for months rather than years. In both the interim roles I have held so far — one year as Chief Executive at the Government of Jersey and six months as Chief Executive at Ealing — the organisations wanted immediate delivery, they did not want to stand still, in fact the reason they hired me as a Chief Executive was because they wanted a different approach. So that's both exhilarating and demanding. An intense experience, and a challenge to add value immediately on arrival.
