Welcome from the Chair of the Appointment Panel



Thank you for your interest in becoming the next Chair of the Board at the Independent Press Standards Organisation (IPSO).

As the independent regulator for the majority of the UK's digital and print news industry, IPSO promotes the public interest through its work supporting high-quality journalism and holds editors and journalists to account when standards fall short. By upholding the highest professional and ethical standards, IPSO protects both the public and freedom of expression. A robust and trusted digital and print news media is a cornerstone of democracy and a shield for the public. Our aim is that regulation by IPSO is a mark of credible and accountable journalism.

Having been led with great distinction by Lord Edward Faulks KC for six years, IPSO is now seeking a new Chair. In line with IPSO's commitments to transparency, the appointment will be made by the independent Appointment Panel, of which I am chair.

This is a dual role: the post holder will chair both the Board of IPSO, which provides strategic leadership to the organisation and oversees its governance, and the Complaints Committee, which considers the most serious complaints.

IPSO is a high-profile organisation with a clear, challenging, and important purpose. It engages with a wide range of stakeholders including editors, policymakers, members of the public, and civil society – all within a changing social, political and commercial context. To balance these competing voices, the role requires someone with a well-established reputation for balance, judgment and integrity. It will suit someone who believes in the vital role of journalism in a free society, who would enjoy being close to the cut and thrust of the news cycle, and who has the analytical skills to parse the complex issues that come before IPSO for adjudication.

About IPSO



Established in September 2014, IPSO regulates 100 publishers with more than 1,800 titles, including most national and almost all local newspapers, and most large magazine publishers. We have dealt with over 160,000 complaints and enquiries over the last decade. We have issued more than 500 confidential privacy notices to protect people concerned about press intrusion.

Most of IPSO's powers and functions were drawn from the findings of the Leveson Report. Since IPSO was established, there have been radical changes in the way that people access news and information – with many accessing unregulated and unchecked online content. Regulation by IPSO sets its members apart by holding them accountable. Good journalism continues to have a vital role to play.

In 2023 IPSO was subject to an independent external review by Sir Bill Jeffrey. The <u>Jeffrey Review</u> found that IPSO was "well led and managed" and "influenced the industry for the better".

What we do

- We make sure that regulated newspapers, magazines, and digital news channels follow the Editors' Code of Practice – the framework we use to regulate the press.
- We investigate complaints about alleged breaches of the Editors' Code and determine the nature, extent and placement of remedies we order.
- We monitor press standards and have powers to investigate serious and systemic standards failings.
- We operate a 24-hour anti-harassment advice line.
- We run a low-cost arbitration scheme to settle legal disputes.
- We provide training and guidance to help journalists uphold the highest standards.
- We provide a whistleblowing service for journalists.
- We work with charities, NGOs and other organisations to support and improve press standards.

Our strategy and principles

Our corporate strategy 2023–2028 explains how we will deliver our core purpose of protecting the public and freedom of expression. Our aim is that independent regulation by IPSO is a mark of credible and accountable journalism. Our purpose is to protect the public and freedom of expression by upholding high editorial standards.

Our principles underpin this strategy and guide how we conduct ourselves and our daily activities:

- Demonstrate independence from government, regulated publications, and other stakeholders. Independence is critical to IPSO's credibility and must be evident in all aspects of IPSO's governance and operations.
- Build transparency to improve trust and understanding of our regulation by the public and by policymakers. IPSO already operates transparently but is committed to making its publicly-available information more engaging and accessible to a range of stakeholders.
- Be responsive to the changing media landscape. Media is becoming far more complex; our publishers are now engaging with audiences through an everincreasing diversity of channels and platforms. IPSO must ensure that its regulation applies in a credible way to the full range of content that falls within its remit, and that its overall approach is adaptable to technological and financial changes in the industry.
- Become an ever more inclusive organisation that is open, accessible and fair.
 IPSO's work is complex and intersects with challenging social and political
 issues. To reflect the world in which we work, we will promote and maintain a
 diverse, inclusive culture. We continue to evolve our structures and ways of
 working to ensure we retain and attract the right talent. This helps us to fulfil our
 remit fairly, robustly, and without bias.
- Be more accessible and accountable to a diverse public. IPSO must communicate its openness to all sectors and ensure that its services are accessible and welcoming to everyone. In developing this strategy, we reviewed and defined the principles by which we will deliver these objectives.

Main responsibilities of the role



The Chair of IPSO chairs the Board of IPSO and also the IPSO Complaints Committee, which makes decisions on individual breaches of the Editors' Code of Practice.

Broadly, the IPSO Chair role falls into three primary strands:

- Providing strategic leadership and accountability for the governance of the organisation, including the performance of the Chief Executive;
- Leading the Complaints Committee in its adjudicatory role, ensuring a wellstructured, collegial and thorough consideration of complaints;
- Acting as a public face of the organisation and advisor on matters relating to external communications and engagement. Currently media interviews are undertaken by the Chair or the Chief Executive.

The Chair of IPSO also serves as an ex officio member, alongside the Chief Executive, of the Editors' Code of Practice Committee, which approves amendments to the Editors' Code, the framework against which IPSO regulates.





The IPSO Board



The Chair supports the **Board** to provide strategic direction to IPSO, create accountability for the Chief Executive and Senior Management Team, and ensure that its governance arrangements are of the highest standards, in keeping with its public role and the scrutiny its work faces.

The Board includes a lay majority of seven members (including the Chair) who have no connection with a publication that is or could be regulated by IPSO. They serve alongside five members with recent senior editorial experience. The editorial members, who may not be currently serving editors, represent the spectrum of journalism regulated by IPSO: at any time, the Board will include two members with national newspaper experience, one member with regional newspaper experience, a member with Scottish newspaper experience, and a member with magazine experience. To reinforce IPSO's independence from Government, Board members – including the Chair – may not be elected members of a UK legislature.

Lord Faulks has a long career as a barrister, specialising in claims arising from the Human Rights Act, among others. He was appointed to the House of Lords in 2010, and now sits as a non-affiliated peer.

The IPSO Complaints Committee



As the chair of the Complaints Committee, the Chair leads the adjudication process for alleged breaches of the Editors' Code of Practice, the standards against which IPSO regulates. This includes chairing 9-10 meetings of the Complaints Committee per year, at which the most serious and complex complaints are considered. It also includes (in common with all members of the Committee) commenting on papers circulated electronically between meetings, generally weekly.

- This appointment requires an outstanding personal record of achievement gained through a senior role in a relevant environment or profession. While the current and past Chair of IPSO have had senior legal experience, we welcome candidates from diverse fields who are able to demonstrate relevant expertise, experience and commitment to IPSO's purpose of upholding editorial standards to protect the public and freedom of expression.
- You will understand IPSO's distinctive purpose and context. While you are
 not a journalist, you have a strong belief in the importance of journalism and
 an intelligent interest in the strategic environment surrounding IPSO's work,
 including the political, economic, technological and social forces affecting
 journalism today.
- You will understand the dual nature of the IPSO Chair role, which includes leading two different committees of public standing, and be prepared to commit the time and focus required to succeed.
- Through your previous professional roles, you will have experience of leadership
 with a public profile. This will have given you a clear understanding of the
 standards of personal integrity expected of someone in this position; personal
 resilience to handle public and occasionally journalistic scrutiny; and experience
 of handling media attention, including media appearances.
- You will understand what it means to be a well-run organisation and the role
 of a Board chair in this, including the principles of good governance, strategic
 oversight, and risk management.
- You will demonstrate a clear understanding of the difference between nonexecutive and executive roles and responsibilities.

Terms of Appointment



Appointment process and eligibility

The Chair of the IPSO Board is nominated by the Appointment Panel in accordance with the Appointment Principles set out in IPSO's Articles of Association.

The Chair must be independent of the industry IPSO regulates. This means they may not have had a senior editorial role in the prior 20 years at a publisher that is or could be IPSO-regulated.

They also cannot be an elected member of a UK legislature.

A party affiliated peer, while not blocked under the regulations, is unlikely to fulfil the independence criteria.

Remuneration and time commitment

This appointment attracts remuneration of £170,000 per annum for a nominal time commitment of two days per week.

Appointment length

This appointment is offered for a term of three years, potentially extendable for a second three-year term.

Location

IPSO's offices are located at 10 Eastcheap, London EC3M 1AJ. All Complaints Committee and Board meetings are held on premises, and members are expected to attend in person unless there are exceptional circumstances.

IPSO staff work core hours of two to three days per week in the office (dependent on seniority). It is expected that the Chair will wish to attend the office regularly, likely at least one day per week.





Appointment process

The nomination will be made by the independent Appointment Panel of IPSO, chaired by Dame Julia Unwin. The panel includes a lay majority alongside individuals with senior editorial experience. Its current membership is:

The selection will be made in accordance with IPSO's Appointment Principles:

- Merit: successful candidates shall be those whose skills, experience and qualities have been judged best to meet the needs of the Company in respect of the relevant post;
- Fairness: the selection process shall be objective, impartial and applied consistently to all candidates. Each candidate shall be assessed against the same published criteria; and
- Openness: information about the requirements of the post and the selection process shall be publicly available and all appointments shall be advertised publicly in a way that is designed to attract a strong and diverse field of suitable candidates.
